### GOT A PROBLEM?

Since everyone has read their rulebooks, we'll never have problems during a match that we can't handle. Right? Well, in the real world we can't always be so lucky. Problems do occur, and everyone should know what to do if it happens.

The first thing to remember is that all of us want to win fairly, and have a good time doing it. Good sportsmanship should be the prevailing attitude at all times. If a problem does occur, the captains should discuss the situation and try to agree on a solution. The captains are ultimately responsible for the satisfactory completion of the match, adherence to the rules, and the conduct of their teammates. They are free to resolve the problem in any manner that they can both agree to, within the rules of darts. (Dueling is not permitted.) If the captains cannot agree to a solution, we do have a way to formally protest the issue.

To file a protest, you must follow the procedures in our rulebook. A protest may be filed for any reason. The captain must submit details in writing to any COD Board Member within 5 days of the incident, and a committee of three uninvolved people will then be appointed to investigate and rule on the issue. The ruling of the Committee and/or the Board of Directors will be final.

Whenever you can, try to work things out. It is in everyone's best interest to have things go as smoothly as possible. Major problems can usually be avoided if we all use good judgement and show consideration for our fellow darters.



## CRICKET STRATEGY by Jim Medley

The best cricket strategy is not to miss your target. Obviously, this is not very helpful as it is easier said than done. There are as many cricket strategies as there are people who play cricket. However, some strategies are more successful than others. Cricket strategy is hardly an exact science. Therefore, many decisions on what to shoot for are based upon the shooters confidence in his own ability as well as his evaluation of his opponents' abilities. Although a logical strategy is advantageous, it is no substitute for good darts. However, intelligent play can defeat superior darts. Because a complete strategy is impossible to describe in one article, this article will just give an overview of a strategy which I have observed to be successful. For a complete cricket strategy, you may wish to refer to Tony Payne's "Thermonuclear Cricket" articles in the "Bull's-Eye News".

Before starting to discuss a particular strategy, let's speak of the scoring of points, an often misunderstood part of cricket. When was the last time you saw a cricket game without any points scored? These games are rare. The objective of the game is to close all the numbers and be ahead on points. The scoring of points prolongs the game, which is advantageous when you are behind, as it gives you an opportunity to catch up. Points also tend to affect people psychologically. It is common occurance to see one person close and score on 20's while his opponent closes and scores on 19's. One thing that I have observed of Columbus darters is that they become intimidated when someone intentionally scores on them or when they are behind in score. It is imperative that one is comfortable scoring points and does not panic when being behind in score.

It is advantageous to close a number and score at the same time, whenever possible. Let's look at the example mentioned above. Player A closes 20's and scores 20, while player B closes 19's and scores 38.

20 A B 38

Player A could throw at 18's possibly closing and scoring at the same time. If he only closes and scores no points, he still has the advantage of 2 numbers to score on. It forces player B to make a difficult shot to close his numbers and retain his lead. By doing such, he is working towards both objectives, closing numbers and the possibility of scoring points.

Let's now suppose that player B had only scored 19 points rather than 38. Player A should also throw for the 18's even though he is ahead on points. By doing so he is still striving for his objective, closing a number and scoring points. If player A chooses to close 19's, one of his objectives cannot be obtained. He cannot score points on the 19's. Suppose player A was to throw 2 single 19's then a triple 19. He has scored a five count but will only get credit for a 3 count. He has wasted his triple and not gotten full value for it. If he had scored a five count throwing at 18's, he would have 2 numbers closed and a substantial point lead. He would have one number closed, that his opponent does not have closed, and a minimal point lead if the 19's are chosen, thus allowing his opponent to close and score on the 18's. This philosophy is applicable throughout the game. Eventually the 19's have to be closed.

The bull's-eye can also be used to one's advantage, especially when coming from behind. I like to use the bull in the middle of the game, usually after 17's. I do this because a triple 17 (51 pts.) is worth more than a double bull. However, a double bull (50) is worth more than a triple 16 (48). Translating this to singles we find that 2 single bulls are worth more than 3 single 16's. There are two advantages to shooting the bull at this time. The first is the bull is worth more than any of the other numbers. Second is the psychological intimidation of your opponent. The bull, like a double in 501, can be very elusive.

If one is behind and closes the bull and points, he forces his opponent to retaliate with points. This also puts pressure on your opponent to close the bull. The bull'seye can be especially elusive when one is forced to throw for it. The bull should also be used when hopelessly behind as you may slop a few numbers while trying for the bull.

As I mentioned before a complete strategy is impossible to explain due to space and unlimited situations. However, I forgot to include a very important strategy tip. That is to win the cork. It sounds obvious but the person who starts the game always has the advantage. Everything equal, the one who begins the game, wins the game.

These strategy hints will not help you throw better darts. That requires practice and concentration, but hopefully they will enable to help you win more games.



Well, dart fans, it's time for another look at some of the COD's dart bars. I thought I would start off with a new bar that has joined our league and is under new management. Formerly known as Popes Inn, the Diamond 1 & 4 Saloon is now owned and run by Sharon and Ron Starner, who have done a complete remodeling of the inside. The saloon is located at 627 Greenlawn Avenue, just west of I-71, and is open from 9 a.m. to midnight, Monday through Saturday. It has two (2) boards, always open for play, and several electronic games in the back. The kitchen, which is always open, serves sandwiches and munchies. This summer, the pub will surely come in handy for all you Clippers fans who want to toss a few (darts and beers) before and after the game, since it's only a trip throw from the stadium. And for those of you wondering about the name of the saloon, it comes from the softball diamonds on Greenlawn and 1 & 4 at one time were the only diamonds with lights.

The second bar is Spanky's V.I.P. which is located on Karl Road and it's only a double out throw from Northland Mall & Theatre. Spanky's, owned by Perry Wilcox and John Capparuccini, opened its doors September of 83, and has been in the league since the 1984 fall season. The pub is open Monday through Friday 4 p.m. to 2:30 a.m., Saturday Noon to 2:30 a.m. and Sunday 7 p.m. to 2 a.m. Along with the two (2) boards, Spanky's also has two pool tables; and every Sunday they sponsor several open pool tournaments with registration starting at 7:30 p.m. There's a darters' special every Monday night on Long Island Iced Tea 'til 9:00 p.m. and Schnapp specials on Tuesday and Wednesday. Tuesday night is their pool league, which closes down one of the dart boards. Perry informs me that there's never a cover charge and a D.J. every night. So the next time you're on the way to the Northland movies and you're early, stop by Spanky's V.I.P.

## C.O.D. and THE A.D.O.

Central Ohio Darters is a charter member of the American Darts Organization, which was formed ten years ago. Being a member of ADO enables us to be a part of a national organization and makes it possible to be united with others in the development and promotion of darts. The ADO sets the standards for dart play throughout the United States.

When the ADO was begun January 1, 1976 with 30 charter member associations (clubs and leagues), the total membership was 7500. Today, with over 270 member associations, the combined membership is well over 50,000 players.

This August, the ADO will be celebrating its ten-year anniversary with a banquet in Las Vegas at the North American Dart Tournament. The tournament will be held at the Sahara Hotel in August 1986.

The number of tournament players in Columbus is increasing. Placing in the top 4 in a singles event in an ADO-sanctioned dart tournament qualifies a player for ADO points. These points serve as a national ranking system. The top ten nationally and top four regionally also received some monetary award. Among COD members who received ADO points in 1985 are Sharon Tolliver, Rob Dixon, Tom Sheets, Brian Uhl and Jim Medley.

The point system for ADO will change in 1986. A tournament less than \$5000 will give points to the top four players in ladies singles and open singles. For a \$5000 to \$19,999 tournament, players that finish in the top 8 will receive points. \$20,000 tournaments and higher will award points down to the top sixteen (16).

For 1986 several people also have ADO points, among these are Leslee Wright Stegall.

The ADO All-Star and Masters qualifiers for this year will be coming up soon. May 11th is the deadline for the association playoffs. The COD will be announcing dates and times for qualifiers for these events. The ADO All-Star team is made up of the finalists from the regional playoffs. They will play the All-Stars from the

British Darts Organization in Las Vegas at the North American Open. It is an honor to be on the ADO All-Star team. So, watch for the announcements and try to qualify. Your support will help send you or someone else to the regional playoffs as a COD representative.


