First of all, it's about time we featured one of the ladies in COD. And who better to honor than the one who has had the most successful darting career of us all-- Jean Zeigler.

Also we are reprinting an article written by Jean in 1979 and originally published in the dart magazine International Spider. Look for it elsewhere in Dart News for an insight into how and why Jean took up this sport, how she discovered Central Ohio Darters, and what her views are on the game.

Jean says she played several years before really winning anything. But during that time she "worked long hours at home on delivery and stance; how I needed to hold the darts to get certain results, balance of points, and combinations of dart equipment. I adjusted and readjusted my weight, etc., for the right combination for my throw. "And the work paid off, because in 1977 the trophies started to come home to Jean's house and haven't stopped. The following are highlights of Jean's career in darts to date:

1977 2nd Place Ladies Singles, Ohio State Dart Championships, Cleveland, O.

1978 1st Place Ladies Singles, Ohio State Dart Championships, Cleveland, O.

1979 Gentral Ohio Darters Womens City Champion

1979 Was awarded the *most valuable player" trophy at the Windy City Open Chicago, and won over \$400 that weekend, including 1st place Ladies Doubles

1980 1st Place Ladies Singles, Washington Open VI, beating Helen Scheerbaum in best of five in finals for \$600

1980 Won 1st Place in <u>both</u> a mixed doubles division and an open doubles division in COD summer league

1980 1st Place Ladies Singles at 1st Annual Queen City Open, Cincinnati, for \$200 and diamond dart ring

1980 Ranked 9th in country by ADO Womens Championship Point Standings

In addition to the above achievements
Jean has won the Ladies Singles events at
least once in the Seven Seas Easter Tourney,
the Salty Seas Tournament (both Columbus),
the Tom Bates Memorial (Galion), the Walter
Kelley Memorial (Columbus), Great Lakes
Classic (Michigan), the MDA Tourney, the
COD Summer Party, and the Gavel Classic
(all Columbus). She also had the distinction
of being the first woman to play in COD's
"A" Division. Currently Jean plays on a team
called FULL-A-BULL V with Ernie Estice, Bob
Rosenblum and Gary Troyan. She is a member
of the T-80 Club and is a past COD board
member.

Jean supports her dart habit (she neither drinks beer nor smokes, however) by working evenings at Riverside Hospital as an EKG tech. She is an artist and a watercolorist, an avid golfer, and a collector. She has two sons and a daughter and six grandchildren.

In the March 1980 issue of International Spider, Jean was referred to as a "rugged competitor" and that seems about as accurate a characterization as one would want, in describing Jean as a darter. She has represented the COD well in many major tournaments during the last six years and here's wishing her many future triumphs.

DARTS - MY BIG TURN ON

Being a professed "tomboy" since a child, I have always liked any sport or game that consisted of throwing an object to a certain spot with accuracy to attain a certain goal. This has taken me through softball, basketball, volleyball, bowling and golf. Each is a competitive and exciting sport. Each is a challenge.

I have projected missiles at objects since I could throw, just to see if I could hit it. I had dart boards over the years, the pasteboard type, usually propped up against a wall and while sitting, throw a dozen or so of assorted darts to the target. But never along the way was I introduced to the English version of darts as we play it today.

While visiting my sister in California several years ago my brotherin-law (a regional director to ADO now working on the World Cup for November) Garry "Gronk" Krause told me how darts were so big in California. Everything's always bigger there he says. We went to a dart bar down at the beach - I watched the games - but didn't really get involved. Several months later he came to

Several months later he came to Columbus ladden with a dart board and promptly set up my rec room with a carpeted back board, a light, and a carefully marked off toe line. He added several sets of darts to

As I began to practice, I began to want to find others who might play in my area. I wanted to know how to get involved. I wrote the <u>Spider</u> and they promptly sent me two names to call for information, Tom Harmon and Jim Blanton. That summer I started in a Cricket league and experienced my first competition.

I was off to the races so to speak with my love affair with darts.
Darts is a high not easily explained.
Darts is infectious, frustrating, exciting, sometimes disappointing, challenging and stimulating - a real turn on. The more you throw, the higher you get. Although you seem

to lose more games than you ever win each time you learn something. You meet new people, make new friends and as you gain confidence, your skill improves, and so does your ability to stay calm.


Playing the guys every Thursday night, in a blind draw, really hones your game. After a three day tourney I'm still on a high for days, and the minute someone says darts, I'm out the door.

As the magic age of 40 came and went, I was content to consider myself a golf nut, playing 3-4 days a week, which was fine when you're a housewife. But now as a working woman I have less daylight hours. I find the same stimuli - or exhileration and strategy in both games. They are very similar in that respect.

Years ago while taking flying lessons, I experienced an exhileration of soaring through the air high above the earth - a real turn on - especially when you touched down again. Darts are that sort of turn on for me and I want to share it with all those not yet introduced to the sport.

From the time Jay & Jeanne Tomlinson took me to my first tournament I was hooked.

The comradery, the competitiveness, the challenge - they're all there in the seemingly uncomplicated game of darts.



FAIR PLAY FOR COD?

In the last issue of Dart News an article by Glenn Remick of the Western Massachusetts Darting Association (WMDA) outlined a handicap system for the game of darts, which he designed and his dart league has used. The gist of the Fair Play system is that league dart throwers establish a handicap for themselves during regular weekly league play and be able to use this handicap for tournament competition in Fair Play tournaments or Fair Play events at regular tournaments. The <u>purpose</u> is to give the inexperienced or less serious darter an equalized chance at some wins against the experienced and serious darters who, it seems, win all the time.

Establishing a handicap must be done over a period of time, rather than as a one-shot deal, so incorporating a system into the regular weekly league season may be the only way of doing it. Also, it is a way of getting a large enough group of people involved to make the results valid and meaningful and chances for

application abundant.

If the COD should decide to try the Fair Play system in our league, this is what it would amount to for each individual league shooter, in terms of time and effort - in addition to the regular league format, players would, each week, "take out" 50 with a maximum of 12 darts. Your score would range from 1 (Double-Bull shot) to 12 (no double shot). This score would be recorded each week. There would also be a team point won for the team whose players scored lowest in the event. This would encourage everyone to do their very best and not "hold back" in order to get a high handicap.

If you still have the last issue of Dart News (July, August) please read over Remick's article again for more detailed information on the system. When the nomination forms for the Board of Directors go out, included will be a questionnaire on this issue. We welcome all

comments and opinions from all COD members as to whether or not we should be one of the first dart leagues to try a handicap system.




